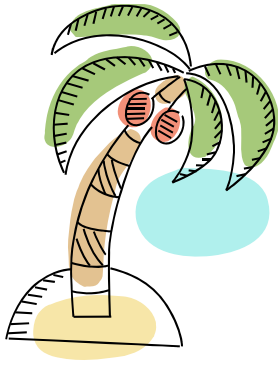

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**A Summary of Ki Tissa**

In this week's Torah portion, Ki Tissa, the Children of Israel stand at a crossroads between faith and fear, commitment and rebellion. Only several months into their new life of freedom, the Jewish people have experienced so many miracles that we can hardly keep track of them all—the splitting of the Red Sea, water from the rock, manna from heaven, and, of course, the Revelation at Sinai. The loving bond between God and Israel appears to be as strong as one between two newlyweds, both aspiring to enter into a life of mutual respect and devotion.

Unfortunately, when Moses returns just one day late from meeting with God on Mount Sinai, something has gone terribly wrong. Without Moses' guiding presence, the Children of Israel feel lost, yearn for security, and in desperation, build a Golden Calf. The Golden Calf is not a random selection or an original creation. By choosing this image, the Israelites conjure a familiar image from their long sojourn in servitude in Egypt. Their actions, so soon after their Sinai experience, represent a regression. This ignominious incident constitutes the darkest moment in Israel's history, so much so that the Midrash in Aichah Rabbah relates that there is not a generation that does not suffer from the sinful reverberations of this faithless act.

Addressing this problem falls upon Moses' shoulders. "*Lekh rayd*," literally "Go down," God tells Moses; He is ordering the former shepherd to descend from the mountain and tend to his straying flock. The terseness of God's words capture the urgent action required to address the chaos and confusion unfolding within the Israelite camp and within their souls.

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## *Israel 60 Years in 60 Seconds*



### The Haganah

There were several Jewish self defense organizations operating during the British Mandate. Modern Jewish organized self defense in Palestine dates back 100 years to the formation of the HaShomer or Guild of Watchmen in 1907 to protect kibbutzim. After Arab riots in 1920 and 1921, the leadership of the Yeshuv organized these groups into the Haganah. The Haganah became larger and more centralized after the Arab massacres of Jews in Jerusalem and Hebron in 1929. By 1936, the Haganah had 10,000 men on active duty and 40,000 reservists when it actively aided the British to quell the Arab revolt.

The Haganah generally observed a policy of havlagah or restraint such that it would defend Jewish communities but not initiate attacks against Arab gangs or their communities. Some members of the Haganah opposed this restraint as defeatist and part of the Haganah broke away to form the Irgun Tzvai Leumi or National Military Organization. The Irgun itself later split over the issue of whether, during World War II, to attack the British, who had banned Jewish immigration to Palestine. The breakaway group which favored such attacks was the

Lechi or Lochamei Herut Yisrael – Fighters for the Freedom of Israel – also known as the Stern Gang after its leader Abraham Stern.

The Haganah, through its elite strike force, the Palmach, organized illegal Jewish immigration into Palestine. Over 100,000 Jews managed to get past the British ban and enter the country. The Haganah also organized demonstrations against the British policy.

During World War II, the British enlisted the cooperation of the Haganah out of fear that the Axis powers would sweep across North Africa. After the British victory at El Alamein stopped Rommel's advance, British support for the Haganah faded.

After World War II, the Haganah engaged in anti-British actions such as the liberation of interned immigrants from the Atlit detention camp, bombing railroad lines, sabotaging British radar and bases and continuing to organize illegal Jewish immigration.

Shortly after Israel declared independence in May 1948, the Haganah was officially reorganized into the Tzevah Haganah L'Yisrael – Tzahal – the Israel Defense Force.
