A Word From the Rabbi

Counting Down, Taking Account

We're in a season of counting down, towards something else. Students (and the instructors) are counting how many sessions remain. Visions of summer vacation, time off.

The Jewish calendar actually has us counting *upward* toward Shavuot: In the Torah — an early summer harvest festival; in the rabbinic calendar, a celebration of the gift of Torah. The Revelation is our people's conversion moment. Our ancestors left Egypt as liberated slaves. At the foot of Sinai, they were transformed into a people with Torah.

Summer timing puts Shavuot in a challenging spot — folks are heading into a break from it all. But when you think about it you realize that Shavuot, spiritually speaking, is a big deal. Passover tells us who we were, and it drives home the lesson that we never want to find ourselves staring at a cruel Pharaoh in the mirror. So what is our mission? Shavuot speaks to the paths of holiness and community. The people of the book, the romance with the word. Shavuot drives home the lesson that we never find ourselves lacking in curiosity and passion for Torah, that our Jewishness is about what we can say and learn and do in our quest for holiness and blessing.

Why count upward toward? Because a life of learning and doing challenges us to up our game.

Hi, I'm Majida - A Journey of Return, Connection, and Becoming

Hebrew name: Miriam Shoshana bat Avraham v' Sarah

Hello, I'm Majida! I'm so honored to be joining CSI and stepping into Jewish life with deep gratitude and joy. My journey to Judaism has felt like both a return and a new beginning—a reconnection with a Jewish soul that has long felt present within me.

As an Afro-Caribbean-Panamanian woman and daughter of Muslim converts, I grew up navigating layered cultural identities. These experiences deeply shaped my commitment to justice, resilience, and community—values that I feel reflected so powerfully in Judaism. I was first drawn into Jewish community work through co-leading the Austin chapter of the Sisterhood of Salaam Shalom and it was through those interfaith connections that I began to sense a deeper spiritual homecoming.

My husband and I enrolled in the *Miller Introduction to Judaism Program*, and those 18 weeks of learning, reflection, and discovery felt like a profound unfolding. Through Torah study, Jewish prayer, Shabbat practice (my favorite Jewish tradition!), and community learning, I found myself embracing the rhythm and depth of Jewish life.

To me, immersing in the mikvah and becoming a Jew represents healing, reconnection, and spiritual transformation. It's where I affirmed a Jewish soul that feels like it's always been within me. I'm especially inspired by the biblical figures of Miriam and Moses—Miriam's courage, leadership, and prophetic wisdom speak to my own aspirations as I step into Jewish womanhood.

Professionally, I founded and practice through *Connection Care Therapy*, where I serve as an Integrative Fertility Counselor, Functional Nutritional Therapist, Fertility Awareness & Sexual Health Educator, and Women's Hormone Health Specialist. In my free time, I love traveling, dancing, music, and calligraphy—creative and nourishing outlets that, like Judaism, connect me to joy and meaning.

I'm deeply moved to be joining the Jewish people in this sacred covenant. I look forward to growing, celebrating, grieving, and healing together—bound by a commitment to community, compassion, and tikkun olam.

DEADLINE EXTENDED FOR

Dr. Lawrence A. Haskins Memorial Trust – 2025

In 1980 Gertie and Harry Haskins, longtime members of Congregation Sha'arey Israel (CSI), established a memorial trust to honor their son Lawrence. A periodontist born and raised in Macon, Dr. Haskins died at the age of 34, leaving a wife and two young daughters.

It was Gertie and Harry's fondest hope that their generosity would further our young congregants' knowledge of Judaism, increase their awareness and understanding of Jewish culture and the Jewish people, and enhance their religious commitment.

PURPOSE

"To perpetuate and enhance Jewish education for CSI students." The Trust, now in its 43rd year sunsets in 2030, so the committee's challenge is to present scholarships to as many young congregants as possible before 2031.

Given the cancellation of most summer camps during the pandemic (2020-2022) Haskins

Trust recipients during those years may use the funds during the summer of 2024 without reapplying for the award. Simply contact me to utilize the funds.

If you are a new applicant please read the guidelines, process, and deadlines below.

GUIDELINES

- 1. A recipient must be between the ages of 10 and 20, which, for the purposes of the scholarship means to be <u>at least 10 years old</u> and no older than 20 years old in the calendar year in which he or she is granted the award or uses the award money.
- 2. An applicant must have attended Sha'arey Israel's religious school for at least one (1) full year.
- 3. An applicant has "achieved scholastic excellence." This is a vague tenet of the scholarship but is contained in the original document.
- 4. The scholarship can be used to defray the cost of:
 - a. Travel to Israel through an approved program, not individual or family travel.
- b. Attendance at a Jewish camp, conference, seminar or convention <u>sponsored by a Jewish organization with which Sha'arey Israel is affiliated.</u>

- c. A Jewish studies course or class in the United States, Israel, or anywhere in the world at an <u>accredited</u> institution. <u>The student/family must provide a course description, proof</u> of enrollment, and final course grade before payment is made.
- 5. We prefer to send payment directly to the camp, school, program, or travel organization. However, if a recipient's family has already paid for the program, payment will be sent directly to the parent(s) with proof of payment.

APPLICATION PROCESS

- 1. The process requires a brief application letter to the committee to include the following information:
 - a. Applicant's name
 - b. Age
 - c. Brief statement of why the applicant believes he/she is worthy of the scholarship
 - d. Name of program and organization or institution, including the address, phone number, date(s) attending, and cost
 - e. Recommendation letter from a Sha'arey Israel congregant or religious schoolteacher familiar with the applicant's character and academic achievement
- 2. Nominations and applications must be received by Monday, May 5, 2025 and should be emailed to Haskins Trust Chair, Jami Gaudet, at jfsgaudet@aol.com.
- 3. Decisions will be made by Monday, May 12, 2025.
- 4. A scholarship award letter will be sent to each winner and the student's name(s) will be announced in the synagogue bulletin and on the bimah at services by the synagogue president.
- 5. The Haskins Memorial Trust committee selects a recipient or recipients annually and approves the use of the funds. The award amount is based on the number of recipients and amount of funds remaining in the Trust. There is no cap on the number of recipients each year.
- 6. The duration of the trust is 50 years and ends in 2030. 2025 is year 45.
- 7. Each recipient may be asked to speak briefly on his/her camp, travel or educational

experience at a Shabbat service upon return. Guidelines will be provided.

Parents and congregants, please encourage our young people to apply for this generous scholarship. If I can answer any questions about the fund or application process, please contact me.


